

We have held 6 auctions and 5 penguin related talks annually.



Conclusion 1

Our activities were based on, auctioning penguin goods, and giving lectures on penguins and the environment surrounding penguins. However, because of Japan's infection control measures due to the pandemic, our activities became difficult to continue. We had to radically change our action plan. Activities that had been conducted face-to-face until now have been changed to internet auctions, live-streamed auctions, and outdoor flea markets, and lectures have also been live-streamed. It was a good point that the number of participants far away from Japan and overseas increased as a result. However, there was also a caveat, there was a risk that the raw data, which was intellectual property, could be stolen. Thus, this has been trial and error in online activities and efforts to protect data. In the end, we were able to carry out the fundraising activities as usual. Infectious disease epidemics have been seen several times in history, developing the world unfortunately at the expense of many victims. We also had a crisis of survival in our own activities, but we were able to survive and be reborn by adopting an online platform and reviewing our activity methods.

Conclusion 2

Another good point was that we had the time to reflect on the fundamental principles of our activities. Inheriting the will of the founder Mr. Aoyanagi, we returned to our philosophy of **sharing our future** with penguins. Before the outbreak of the infectious disease, some participants misconstrued it as a mass sale of penguin goods, and they lost sight of their original activities. However, in the midst of the massive increase in the prevalence of SARS-CoV2, we are taking the time to consider slowly, and we have unfortunately sacrificed a part of the life form of humans, but remembered that survival of penguins was always endangered.

Now, we feel that we must try to understand penguins more and understand the environment surrounding them. In the future, we would like to extend our online activities to the world, recruit speakers and audience members, and deepen our understanding of penguins.
